

September 2019 Summary Health & Safety Performance Report

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Executive Summary

Accident Frequency Rate (AFR) Overview:

- The Major Projects 12 month rolling AFR to September 2019 remained at 0.05.
- There were **2 RIDDOR** accidents reported in September 2019.
- 1 RIDDOR fell out of the scope of the rolling AFR calculation.
- The in-month AFR was **0.12** and the net 12 month recorded hours decreased by 4.62% (19.9m to 19.1m).
- The Operations 12 month rolling AFR to September 2019 decreased from 0.06 to 0.05.
- There were **0 RIDDOR** accidents reported in September 2019.
- 1 RIDDORs fell out of the scope of the rolling AFR calculation.
- The in-month AFR was **0.00** and the net 12 month recorded hours decreased by 0.28% (20.42 to 20.36m).
- The overall Supply Chain 12 month rolling AFR to September 2019 remained at 0.05.
- There have been **21 RIDDORs** in the rolling 12-month period.
- 2 RIDDORs fell out of the scope of the rolling AFR calculation.
- The in-month AFR was **0.06** and the net 12 month recorded hours decreased by 2.38% (40.4 to 39.46m).

Lost time Incidents:

- There have been 8 Lost Time Incidents reported this month - 3 in Major Projects, 4 in Operations & 1 in TO/RCC

Fatality Data:

- The National Incident Liaison Officer (NILO), media and police reports provide information on the number of fatalities on the strategic road network. These data sources indicated that there had been **21 fatal incidents and 1 suicide** on the Strategic Road Network

Service Strikes:

- There have been 4 service strikes reported this month

Vehicle Incursions:

- There have been 124 Vehicle Incursions reported this month

Bridge Strikes:

- There has been **0** Bridge Strikes reported this month

Incidents Reported:

- There have been **2 RIDDOR** incident reported in September.

Site Inspections:

- There were 25 inspections carried out in August 2019 by the H&S Division, 16 in Major Projects and 9 in Operations




Graph 1 – Rolling AFR for Supply Chain - Major Projects








Graph 2 – Rolling AFR for Supply Chain - Operations



Based on our current understanding there are 21 fatalities due to road traffic collisions and we estimate 1 suicide on the SRN in September 2019. 

Vehicle incursions into roadworks





The welfare unit is solar powered, with Hydrogen cells as back up. The only by-product is water. It has ultra-low energy fittings. The tap is 16W per press, kettle 33W per cup of water, 14W per minute microwave, 44W per hour light. The unit can be monitored on an app to observe energy usage or identify potential misuse. As well as huge environmental benefits, there is no need for generators, fuel, and much less maintenance. Trained GAP Services employees are authorised to come to site (accompanied) to maintain the Hydrogen cells		
		when necessary, this risk will not be transferred to bmJV staff or contractors.

Road User Performance and Road User Safety

• As part of the Safer Highways Event at Silverstone on the 11 September 2019 we held our first Van Safety Summit with speakers from across government, including Driver Vehicle Standards Agency, Health & Safety Executive as well as a range of private sector organisations addressed over 100 organisations who operate van fleets. The summit provided an overview on key emergent safety issues in the sector, shared examples of best practise for business and reinforced the importance of vehicle and driver compliance to improve safety. The summit supports the development of our Van Safety Framework which will be launched in November 2019, this will set out our approach to improving the safety of vans on our network. This will build on our Driving for Better Business programme and focuses on collaboration with key stakeholders and raising the levels of compliance of business operated vans and their drivers. This will be supported by further research and customer insight which allows the development of more targeted and effective interventions.



• We launched the **Highways England Smart Motorways Awareness Training for the Roadside Rescue and Recovery Industry** – Driver Certificate of Professional Competence (CPC) Course on the 12 September at the West Midlands Regional Control Centre with around 25 influential recovery industry representatives (including AA and RAC) and journalists. The training was developed in collaboration with Network Training Partnership (NTP) specifically for recovery operators, it is an 8-hour enhanced comprehensive training package aimed at roadside rescue and recovery drivers who use the motorway network across England, and has been designed to aid practical, relevant training. The core aims of the course is to identify and discuss the different types of smart motorway and educate on safe working practices for recovery operators when attending breakdowns and collisions through incident scenarios, as well as promotion of our key safety messages.



- Operational colleagues will now receive **Customer in Crisis training** on how to identify and respond to people in crisis on the network. The training will form part of the mandatory Trauma in the Workplace training and will provide colleagues with awareness and understanding of suicides and their contributory factors, how to recognise someone who may be in crisis and how to respond it's not what you say but how you make someone feel valued, connected and safe. The training is based on the research undertaken by, Professor Christabel Owens at Exeter University, 'Public Involvement in Suicide Prevention: The Stranger on the Bridge'. The research looks at the core components of an effective intervention by a member of the public, taken from detailed interviews with those with real experiences, including two traffic officers from the East Midlands. The training will be rolled out to all operational colleagues this financial year.
- Notes on Bridges New policy and guidance has been issued for dealing with hand written suicide prevention notes on bridges. In 2018, we saw an increasing trend for messages of hope and decorations being attached to bridges with the aim to reach out to those in crisis and reduce the number of suicides. We commissioned Samaritans and Ulster University to undertake research which investigated whether the messages have an impact on the rates of incidents of suicidal behaviour at bridges and the impact of media coverage. The findings from the research suggests that there is no statistically significant benefit to the notes and that there may cause harm by highlighting locations. Samaritans recommends that Highways England takes a precautionary approach to the issue, and in collaboration, have written a guidance note which will support regional teams by providing a clear and consistent line to take.





Road User Performance and Road User Safety – continued.

• We launched **Operation Pennine** on Monday 24 September, a month of action to improve safety on the M62 between Port of Liverpool, Hull and Immingham Port. We have joined up with six police forces, the Health and Safety Executive and the Driver and Vehicle Standards Agency (DVSA) to reduce commercial vehicle incidents on this corridor. Operation Pennine will see enforcement agencies carry out checks on vans and lorries for road worthiness, secure loads, weight and drivers' hours. We will also use one of the HGV supercabs to patrol the M62 and record drivers of all types of vehicles committing mobile phone or other safety offences while travelling along the M62. The month of activity, which will run until Friday 18 October, follows the success of a similar safety week on the M1 earlier this year which led to the number of collisions falling by almost a third over.





- Our Regional Safety Co-ordinator from the East Region has led a multi-agency partnership to develop an enhanced **Young Riders Motorcycling Compulsory Basic Training** programme. This has built on research and analysis, including intervention mapping, detailed casualty analysis and ongoing engagement with DVSA and Motorcycle Industry Association. The trial has led to the creation of a scalable and sustainable enhanced CBT programme, from 1-day to 2-days training, with eLearning modules that can be delivered nationally.
- We have received a <u>number of</u> high profile **Prince Michael's International Road Safety Awards**; the awards give public recognition to those which have developed initiatives which have made an outstanding contribution to international road safety. These awards are judged by an independent international road safety expert panel. The awards given are for: our partnership with '<u>BabyBox</u>' which provides targeted road safety resources through education and tangible rewards to expectant parents; our Smart Motorway Compliance programme which has focussed on improving driver understanding and compliance with Red X signals; and our research and development of the Young Riders Motorcycling Compulsory Basic Training programme. The winners of all the awards will be invited to meet HRH Prince Michael of Kent at a Gala Presentation to be held in December.
- Our **Regional Safety Coordinators** continue to deliver a range of partnership activities, including: a multi-agency operation held at the Chorley services on the M6 to target unsafe loads which came in time to highlight load safety during National Lorry Week. Officers from Warwickshire Police Serious Collision Unit, Highways England, DVSA, HMRC, and the Environment Agency, teamed up to tackle over-laden, under-secured and potentially dangerous loads. The operation pulled in 54 vehicles with an 87% hit rate. This meant 47 of the vehicles stopped had at least one offence identified. Two people were arrested on the day for theft of a motor vehicle, with the van in question recovered for forensic investigation.







National Health & Safety Team Update

- a) Success in the South West: On Monday 2 September the SW achieved two years without a RIDDOR and on 9 September celebrated achieving 2,000,000 hours without a RIDDOR. They marked the 2,000,000 hours by holding safety stand downs at each of the offices, depots and outstations to consider how we can maintain our current safety performance. There was good engagement from Traffic Officers and office staff that resulted in a number of suggestions such as head torches for Traffic Officers and improved mental health support in our offices. They are now working with colleagues to deliver these simple, but important improvements.
